Little Harvey's Healing Journey

Little Harvey arrived at the Refuge in late February this year. Harvey was underweight as a result of dental issues, and he also needed surgery to remove a cyst the size of a golf ball that was attached to his jaw.

Harvey was a timid and anxious little fellow, so his care needed to be slow and gentle. Our first step was to put Harvey on a special diet of soft food that would help him gain 50 pounds.



Harvey's large cyst was removed, and thanks to the extra weight he gained, he tolerated and came out of the sedation perfectly.

Unfortunately, the first night after the surgery Harvey scratched his incision and broke open his stitches, extending his recovery time to four weeks. Our care team enjoyed lots of quality time with Harvey during his recovery, including walks around the farm every day, extra grooming, and daily health care of cleaning and re- bandaging his surgical incision.

Once healed, Harvey was just too anxious to handle supervised visits into the mini herd,



Once Harvey had gained enough weight to endure sedation, his surgery was booked. Dr. Heather from Kamloops Large Animal Clinic came out to the Refuge Infirmary with her team and all her equipment for the operation.



so we decided to move Harvey to the barn off the Infirmary where he could learn to make friends with our two gentle mini jennies Skye and Silkie. We are happy to report that Harvey is now settled in the mini herd!

President's Message

Over the last eight years the Turtle Valley Donkey Refuge Society has successfully built over 20,000 square feet of Barns for the Donkeys as well as our 2000 square foot Donkey Hospital. With your generosity, we have created an amazing home for the rescued and surrendered donkeys that have come into our care.

During our pandemic closure to the public, we focused on building out the Donkey Hospital, and this year in February we received Little Harvey who required surgery to remove a cyst the size of a golf ball from his jaw. This surgery was successfully done in our own Infirmary which meant Harvey did not need to travel out of town for the operation and could receive his post operative care from our Herd Health Staff.

Currently we are hard at work on the new Senior Barn and Infirmary Expansion, to help us house our aging resident donkeys & new senior donkey arrivals. Because of their adaptation to a desert environment, Donkeys are not suited to our cold winters or wet weather and so they

need a large indoor space during our Canadian weather extremes.

Every week we receive calls from elderly donkey caretakers who are aging out of ranching and selling their farms, and are unable to place their senior donkeys. These caretakers are anxious to find a safe and caring home where their senior aged donkeys can live out their final years. Like humans, senior Donkeys require more care as they develop the typical ailments of aging such as cataracts, arthritis, digestive issues, and other chronic conditions.

Many equine caretakers are not ready to take on the challenge of caring for a senior donkey or mule, although the animal may have years of companionship and enjoyable life ahead of them. This is where the Refuge is able to step in and, with your help, make sure that we have enough space to care for senior donkeys who need us.

We are proud to have created a wonderful home for the Donkeys and we thank everyone who has been part of this amazing journey to create a safe, secure and permanent home for donkeys in need.

Training Rita to Trust

In 2016, we received a call to take in five donkeys and a mule that had been rescued from an Equine Meat Buyer. When Rita the mule arrived at the Refuge we were warned by the Transport Driver to be careful around her as she was likely to hurt anyone who tried to get near her.

Rita arrived wearing a ragged halter but due to her extreme fear of people she would not let us remove it, and eventually it fell off. Over the years we have tried multiple times to try and sedate Rita for a health check up and medical care, including blow darts delivering sedation needles; unfortunately, Rita's adrenalin would fight the sedation and she would not succumb.





This past winter, Dr. Heather ordered special sedation that we administered in Rita's food using an increasing dose every second day – but this was also unsuccessful.

Despite our best efforts, our goal to use sedation to make sure Rita's care check could be completed was not successful. Rita was still extremely fearful of humans and was not going to trust anything that we did. The good news was that in the years Rita has lived here at the Refuge, we have given her time to realize we are not going to hurt her and she has stopped running out of the barn or paddock whenever a human comes near her.

We were also very fortunate this Spring when Sandra of HippoLogic Clicker Training, who specializes in Equine Clicker Training, reached out to us.

Rita has now been in training for 6 months, her trust is building, and she is slowly releasing her fear of being around humans. Rita has made massive progress and is now comfortable being close to her trainer while she works to solve puzzles to find treats. We are continuing to work with Rita to build her trust so eventually we will be able to give her a full medical checkup.

Mules are not born with this fear of humans; they learn it as a result of abuse in the hands of humans.
